September is here, and it's not just about the changing seasons. It's also Intergenerational Month, a time to honor and appreciate the bonds that tie generations together.

This year, we want to shine a spotlight on our amazing kinship caregivers.
Kinship caregivers are the unsung

heroes who step up to provide a loving and stable home for children when their biological parents can't. Whether it's grandparents, aunts, uncles, or even close family friends, they play a crucial role in shaping the lives of these young ones.

We are proud to introduce one such caregiver, Kimberly Brock:

"When DCF contacted me about taking in my two-year-old great nephew and his newborn baby sister I did not hesitate to say, "Yes." I believe that if there is a family member that is capable of caring for the children without them being placed into a stranger's home then that person should step up.

"I will not lie to you and tell you that it is easy. I am a single mom and my life was turned upside down. However, to see the love and gratitude in their eyes and the smile on their faces every single day; to know that you are giving them a life they had not known before you, makes every struggle more than worth it.

The most important thing to remember is that you are NOT alone! My friends and family have stepped up and really been supportive in the most amazing way. Communities Connected for Kids has been such an important player in the process. Martha (a kinship navigator who helps caregivers literally navigate the process) has been a godsend! I have found support in joining the Kinship meetings and just knowing that when I call with questions they answer and provide solutions both financially and emotionally.

"Being a caregiver is the most selfless act one can do. It will bring you to your knees and humble you to the reality that all you have to do to make an impact is care!"
