March 2025 Minutes

1) Call to Order – Ms. Wiles has called the meeting to order at Board members include: Michelle Miller, Melanie Wiles, Dr. Angie Bailey, Mark Young, Gloria Seidule, Leslie Kroeger, Pat McCoy, Vanessa Farnes

- 2) Board Chair Comments- Ms. Wiles presents:
 - N/A
- 3) February Minutes- Melanie Wiles reports:

Mr. Young made a motion to approve the February 2025 Minutes, and Ms. Bailey, seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

- 4) CEO Report- Ms. Deloach presents
 - Christy Gillis is our guest today. She is here
 - We have a new Secretary of DCF. Secretary Harris has gone to ACHA, and Taylor Hatch is the new Secretary of DCF. Her message is that it is a new day, and I want to make some progress.
 - We asked for \$1.7M to cover this year's shortfall. They examined the 3 M risk pool proportion and allocated 13% of what they requested to everyone. We will need to depend on the back of the bill to make us whole. We got \$216K and \$225K from the risk pool. In the past, there were 3 CBCs running deficits. This time, there were about 10, with 3 not applying for funds.
 - Michelle, "What are we doing legislatively? What are we asking for, and who may be the holdouts?" The KPMG formula we are working on is still pending. The leadership of both chambers states that they will not include the funding formula in statute, but rather in the GAA. They want to monitor it as a pilot and see what the recommended dollars from KPMG, an additional \$29M, can be spread into core funding. The first year will be harmless.
 - The ITN for case management and adoptions will be coming out.



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- All lead agencies have been working on what they feel would be added value to the contracts. Cheri has taken that on and built into it. We have 10 items we will be requesting. We are asking for \$3M+. We will see if it has any legs.
- DCF inspector general will be conducting a review of foster care, eligibility policies and procedures, and making sure payments are being made to eligible clients.
- We have received from Nancy a contract amendment that includes the adoption target. We are at 85. Next year's goal is 85 with a stretch goal of 105. We will refine the training for the Board, which we have already done. Nancy Wall is also working on the new ESEP contract. We are hopeful that it will be renewed for another year.
- A project I have been involved with is SINSFINS and the rewrite of chapter 984. There is a Senate bill 1344 and 1405 is the House Bill. It strengthens the positions of the court and schools. Runaway children will be held responsible, and so will parents. We are exploring ways to reach these children earlier. There are a total of 29 bills related to child welfare filed. Grandparent rights, parental rights, investigations, etc., are being examined.
- SB 1618 and HB 415. While there may be some discussion, I don't think anything will happen this session with those bills on limited liability insurance. ANI, our broker and the broker for most lead agencies, has already received letters stating that their insurance is being canceled. Sarasota's insurance and three others were canceled, despite premiums having doubled and being paid. We just renewed ours on January 1st. The prevailing sentiment is to penalize insurance companies because taxpayers fund this insurance, and they are increasing their rates. We're required by statute to have insurance. Sexual liability is an area where insurance companies are paying the most claims. They received \$10 million for premiums and paid \$18 million in claims. ANI has done a lot of work, and they only present the best one to us.

5) External Affairs/Advocacy- Ms. Kaiser presents

- A lot of the springtime work is making a plan. We have several events. April 4th is the volunteer breakfast. Please sign up for that. The manicure movement is in April. We are preparing 50 kits. This is the activity awareness to paint one fingernail blue to represent 1 in 5 kids abused by the time they are 18.
- Press releases in the last month indicate that we achieved the adoption goal was met. We had several shoe donations. Our shoe pantry is great with brand-new shoes. I recently instituted an office day to give people an opportunity to figure out what they need.
- 1K registration is up and available. We have 100 shirts free for the first 100 people who register. We are looking for sponsors. I would like to recognize some of our board members who have supported us, such as Steve. Thank you to Sea Coast and Vanessa for hosting the foster family pool party.

6) QA Committee Report – Mr. Kline reports:

- The subcommittee meeting was at 2 pm today.
- We reviewed our incident report and missing child reports. We had one less this month, from 47 to 46. We had 9 missing kids this month. There were no patterns or trends we needed to look out for or report to the Board.
- Our current missing children are 0.
- CQI is held tomorrow and we will meet with all our providers and where our data is with them.
- We moved from red to green for kids re-entering out-of-home care.



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- We're at 21 of 54 of our desk reviews.
- Our contract monitoring from the QM side is all done for December. We're writing those reports.
- Our current project involves monitoring our IL program, and we're now entering the testing phase.
- Other priorities include sunsetting Blossom House and WeCare.

7) Finance Report – Ms. Hahn reports:

- We have another amendment forthcoming, which will have financial implications. FFTA dollars will include \$216K and \$254K from the risk pool. We have an adjustment for the guardian assistance subsidies and adoption subsidies. We need to pay back some of that money at about \$400K. The FFTA dollars weren't expected, and we are grateful they are coming.
- February is great to present as there are fewer days in the month, so salaries, etc., are lower.
- Our lead agencies' costs are within budget year to date.
- We had a surplus this month, so that reduces our deficit for the month.

Ms. Miller made a motion to approve the February 2025 financials, and Mr. Kroeger seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

• The 990 is being presented. Nothing has changed. The formula remains the same, and the numbers originate from the audit, so nothing is unique to highlight. The data comes from the June 30^{th,} 2024 report.

Ms. Kroeger made a motion to acknowledge the 990 Draft Report, and Ms. Miller seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

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CEO Report April 2025

On April 4th during the bi-weekly call with the Lead Agency DEOs and DCF leadership, we had our first opportunity to hear from Taylor Hatch, the new DCF Secretary. Her message was clear: DCF and the provider community need to be agile, based on data, look at what is working, and expand on that while assessing what is not working, and with agility, changing direction. She believes in transparency and in working together in partnership while acknowledging that we will not always have agreement.

Amendment 3 to our DCF contract is routing. This will add the agreed-upon adoption goal of 75 for the fiscal year we are in (24/25). At the end of February, that goal had already been surpassed. We have negotiated a new goal for FY 25/26 of 84 finalizations. It also includes the updated Board training language for onboarding vs annual requirements. As a reminder, the Board needs to complete Fraud, Waste, and Abuse as well as HIPAA training and send the certificates to Nicky Smith or to me, and I will get them to her.

Amendment 4 is currently being routed at DCF. This amendment will add the Family First Transition Act (FFTAA) and Risk Pool dollars. The FFTA is \$216,193, and the Risk Pool award is \$225,042, leaving \$1,313,065 for our Back of the Bill request.

The case management ITN for Indian River, Martin, and Okeechobee Counties was released on March 28th. It is posted on the FCC website, and notices were sent to all local providers. Sealed proposals are due on the 9th of May. Oral presentations are June 5th and 6th, with posting of the intent to award on June 25th. After negotiations, the contract start date is anticipated as October 1, 2025.

Since the last Board meeting, the House and Senate have released their GAA bill (SB2500 and HB5000) and implementing bills (SB2502 and HB5001). For Core funding, the Senate has CCKids at \$39 million while the House has us at \$24 million. There is no detail, but we believe the \$39 million includes all the pass-throughs, which, if subtracted out, will probably be closer to the \$24 million. The Senate bill clearly states that core services funding will be allocated as provided in the GAA. It includes a very expanded version of the KMPG model for beta testing during FY25/26. By December 1, 2025, a report of the findings is due to the Governor, House Speaker, and Senate President in time for the January 2026 session. This expanded KMPG model is not in the House's GAA, so much negotiation to come. Through the FCC CEO Council, we have submitted a lengthy list of questions to DCF concerning what has been included in the Senate version. DCF has assured us it was not them who developed this expanded KMPG model.

Funding for our ESEP program is included in the House budget but not yet in the Senate. A call was made to Senator Harrell's office, and we were assured (as we had been last year) everything will work out.



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To comply with our Sunshine Contract, board members must complete fraud, waste, abuse, and HIPAA training. Once completed, the certificate and attestation need to be emailed back to Elisabeth Eugene. She will forward them to Nicky Smith, Training Director. The training is available on My FL Learn.

As of this writing, no further information has been forthcoming, nor have requests for additional information been made under the Public Records Request from Florida Children's First. CCKids has also heard nothing further from DCF regarding the funding needed for the additional services exercise.

SB1344, the revision of the CINS/FINS chapter 984, has moved through several committees as it is doing in the House. Through the FCC the Lead Agencies have provided questions and few suggested changes. The Senator is very receptive to our input. If enacted as currently written the Courts will have more options in handing children who are truant, ungovernable and runners. In addition, the bill strengthens the children's and parents' accountability in accessing voluntary and court-ordered services.

The advertisement for Lorrene Egan's County Director position has been posted. There will be two levels of interviewing, the first of which hopefully will start no later than the week of April 21st.

CCKids has learned that Cayuga Centers, one of our child placing agencies (CPA), is closing programs throughout Florida. This includes our CPA contact in C19. They say they are operating I the red and that cannot continue. Cayuga will be submitting a budget to us showing what it would take to keep them operating in C19. If the budget is something we cannot meet, we will look to 4KIDS and Camelot to pick up Cayuga's current homes and homes in the process of being licensed.

Upcoming activities: On April 17th, I will participate in the Parent Council call. Hopefully, we can garner additional participation. On April 21, CCKids will receive an in-person visit from Christy Gillis, the Acting Southeast Region Community Development Director, and Tami Gonyea, the Director of Partnerships and Prevention. The idea is to get to know each other better.

Finally, I want to thank and recognize Vanessa Farnes, CCKids Corporate Volunteer of the Year, for all the help she and Seacoast Bank do to further our efforts. And to Clerk Michelle Miller, who, despite not feeling well, went to such lengths to help us get a packet via priority mail to the Court in Kansas, allowing two children to be returned to their home state.

Departmental reports follow:



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ST LUCIE COUNTY

Lorrene Egan, St Lucie County Director

The overall caseload for St. Lucie case management has continued to be around 250 children. Case management retention has improved significantly over the past six months, allowing us to have more seasoned dedicated staff and lower caseloads per case manager.

ESEP continues to do well. As of the end of March, it had served 37 families and 90 children. Ninety percent of those children remained in their homes.

MARTIN COUNTY

Denise Natalizio, MS, Martin County Director

In March, I participated in the Martin County Interagency Coalition and board meetings.

Martin County Case Management

Fortunately, MC continues to have a very low number of families currently open. With approximately 45 children, the caseload ratios remain low.

Level I Licensing (Relatives and Non-Relatives)

The team is working with 122 families. Our goal is to license 40% of this population, but we have been fluctuating between 39% and 41%.

Level II-V Licensing (traditional/therapeutic/medical)

While we have a current net loss of 3 foster homes for the 2024/2025 fiscal year, we have a net gain of 22 beds as several homes have increased their capacities. Our CPAs (Child Placing Agencies) have a combined 30 homes in the licensing process.

Kinship Navigator Program

We are engaging with kinship caregivers to provide support and needed resources; the team served 12 new families in December and 128 this fiscal year.



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INDIAN RIVER & OKEECHOBEE COUNTY

Caryn Toole, Okeechobee, and Indian River Director

Road to Success Program:

- EFC = 15 (+ 15 EFC Out of County Services)
- Aftercare/PESS = 24
- Under 18 minors served =58

The Road to Success staff continue to work with our clients from 13 to 23 on all aspects of available programming.

Okeechobee:

This month, County Director Caryn Toole participated in the Health and Human Services and Department of Juvenile Justice Council meetings. Caryn attended the Okeechobee Sexual Assault Recovery Team monthly meeting.

Indian River:

County Manager Caryn Toole is a member of the United Way of Indian River County Board of Directors, she attended her monthly board meeting. Caryn is also a member of the Samaritan Center (a transitional living program for Homeless Families) Advisory Board and attended their monthly board meeting. Caryn participated in the Healthy Start of Indian River County Community Action team studying Infant Mortality and participated in both bi-monthly meetings. This month Caryn also participated in the IRC Children's Services Council Grant subcommittee monthly meeting, the IRC Executive Roundtable meeting, and the IRC School and Health Advisory team meeting. Caryn also attended a School District of Indian River County Community impact meeting.

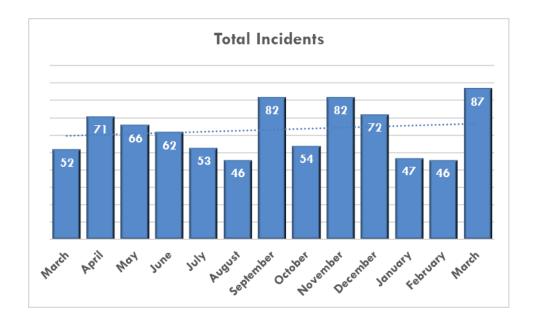
Quality Management/Risk Management:

The data highlighted below represents incident reports received during March 2025. They will be presented to CCKids Senior Management, County Directors, Program Directors, and Case Manager Supervisors.



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87 incidents were reported during the month of March 2025. Of the 87 incidents, 5 were listed as secondary categories in conjunction with other incidents. These reports listed 39 individual children, 4 parents, and one employee as active participants. Nine of the 39 children are placed in Circuit 19 by another CBC agency and are only receiving courtesy supervision services from CCKids. Of the 39 children involved, 18 were named as participants in more than one incident report and/or incident type.

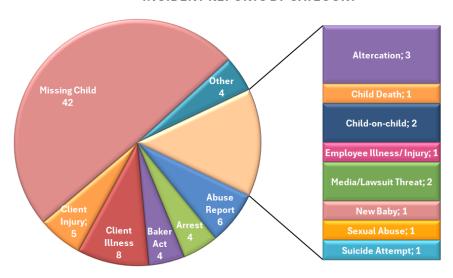


The total number of incidents reported increased significantly from February to March and is well above the average (61) for the last 12 months.

TRAINING AND DEVELOPMENT

Nicky Smith, Director of Training and Development

The next cycle of Pre-Service Training for Case Managers and Licensing staff is scheduled to begin May 5, 1015. The training team is continuing to provide individual mentoring and coaching support for recent graduates who are working to attain their case manager certification. Upcoming in-service training includes topics related to Supervising for Excellence and Facilitation Skills Training.

I continue to participate in the monthly meeting with representatives from DCF, and the Florida Certification Board to discuss collaboration and share information about training issues across the state. I continue to participate in the monthly collaborative forum as we plan for the roll-out of the new Academy. I continue to participate in the Florida Certification Board Advisory Council and on the ethics subcommittee, where we meet monthly to review ethics complaints from across the state. I continue facilitating the monthly FCC Quality & Training Sub-committee and participating in the monthly FCC Systems Operations meeting. In addition, I continue to participate in the FCC 2025 Conference Planning Committee, which meets on a monthly basis.

The CCKids Compliance Committee continues to meet quarterly. There have been no FWA incidents or incident reports that needed to be reported to Sunshine Health. The annual HIPAA and FWA training has been assigned to the CCKids Board and Staff. The next Compliance meeting is scheduled for 4/28/25.



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FINANCE

Lauren Hahn, CFO

Nine months into our fiscal year, we have seen some significant impacts on our year-to-date deficit. In the first 3 months of the fiscal year, we experienced an operating deficit of approximately \$420,000. In the last six months, we have experienced only \$17,000 in operating deficits, keeping the year-to-date deficit flat at approximately \$438,000.

Although salaries are slightly above budget, the company has done a tremendous job in cutting OT in half!

Foster care administration and group care remain the line items putting us in a deficit position.

All activities under our DCF contract operated at a \$959,000 deficit for the first nine months of the fiscal year. This is an improvement over our original estimate of a \$1,754,300 deficit for the year—our risk pool ask.

Kudos to the Independent Living and Early Services Engagement programs, which are both operating surpluses. This is having a tremendous impact on reducing our overall deficit.

There is no news yet, but we will continue to pursue "Back of the Bill" funding for funds not awarded through the risk pool.

Unfortunately, we have no news on the status of the funding model. Language has been proposed in the implementation bill (SB 2502), and the CBCs are working with DCF to understand this new or revised model and its implications.
